e know there are four seasons in a year. We sow in spring and harvest in fall. It would not work if we were to do it the other way around. But 2 Timothy 4:2 says, "Preach the word! Be ready in season and out of season." The Apostle Paul seems to be saying that, unlike natural sowing and harvesting, which must regard the seasons, the sowing of the gospel should continue in any season. This is contrary to our human tendency to preach the word only when the season is favorable and convenient.

So, are we "in season" or "out of season" for COM's ministry to the Chinese?

When I read reports of Chinese students and scholars who continue to hunger for spiritual truths, I believe we are in season. A staff member in Florida reports that one Chinese scholar who was planning to join the online Bible study was warned three minutes before that she should not attend, or she would be reported to her supervisor in China! Despite the threat, she took the risk and still participated in the group.

On the other hand, it is out of season when I consider the impact of COVID-19 and the rising geopolitical tensions between US and Chinese governments. In-person meetings may not be as safe, and at the same time, Chinese students and scholars may not feel as welcome here in America. Not as many new Chinese students are planning to come to our universities for the fall semester. We are wrestling with these real challenges in our ministry.

So, this is how I personally interpret Paul's teaching in 2 Timothy 4:2—I really don't need to care if it is "in season" or "out of season." The more important question to ask is: Are we preaching the Word? I'm happy to say: Yes, we are!

I am grateful for your faithful prayer and support throughout the years. We continue to need your partnership, especially in challenging times like these. Thank you for being such a blessing to our ministry. May God bless you!



Former Student Now Ministers with Returnees in China

When Joshua arrived as a student in the United States, he didn't know Jesus. He had no idea yet of the story that God was writing in his life. Today, Joshua is back in China as a leader in returnee ministry, passionate for God's kingdom.

#### God's Calling in Joshua's Life

s a young Chinese college student in America, Joshua was touched by the loving outreach of Christians around him. He eventually came to Christ himself, was baptized, and began a journey of discipleship. Soon, Joshua met a campus staff member with China Outreach Ministries who became his mentor and trusted friend.

For two years, Joshua continued to grow stronger in his faith with a heart for serving among Chinese students. As a volunteer with COM, he connected with other staff members and began to explore the possibility of serving on staff himself. But God had other plans.

As Joshua explained to his father in China that he was considering staying in America, his father was deeply grieved by the idea of the long distance. This caused Joshua to realize a profound spiritual truth—if an earthly father feels this much pain in separation from his child, how great the pain of separation between our heavenly father and those who might have known him!

Joshua says this realization was "a strong calling" from the Lord. He was led to return to China, so that he could be part of helping more people come to Jesus.

#### Returnee Ministry in China

With a flexible professional job in China, Joshua has freedom in his schedule to serve in volunteer ministry with students and scholars who return from studying abroad. This is a critical time for such work, with large numbers of returnees.

When students and scholars return to China, there are many challenges. They face a highly competitive job market, extended commutes on public transportation, and exceptionally long work hours.

For those who return as new believers or seekers, the challenges are even more complex. It is often difficult to find a church, as many "family" churches are not open to the public. These small groups also have limited resources for discipleship and sometimes few peer relationships for young professionals. Returnees often face a "spiritual homesickness" compared to their church experience in America. In a rapidly changing, materialistic culture, it is easy for them to drift away.

Serving in returnee ministry, Joshua is part of providing:

- Training to churches and ministries in and out of China
- City groups to offer regular fellowship for returnees
- Follow-up with those who are drifting in their faith

## God's Hand at Work through the Global Pandemic

When COVID-19 emerged, Christians in China were quick to respond. Working in cooperation with the government and other organizations, churches took initiative to send masks and food supplies to Wuhan. This practical help, Joshua says, showed love through their actions.

Then something else pivotal happened—church leaders started a "prayer altar." These daily online meetings soon drew about 500 people, praying not just for China, but for countries around the world. "This opened up my vision," Joshua says, "to see God's hand moving."

There is a big need in China, Joshua shares, for mature Chinese Christians to minister to others in the church. "Those who have knowledge—with humility—can be a huge blessing," he says. Joshua is also enthusiastic about

believers from China going to unreached nations with the gospel. Whether they go out or stay in China, he challenges fellow believers to think about what God will do through them.

was a good churchgoer for many years. But in 2001, as I experienced God's faithfulness and provision, I decided to give my life to Christ and to serve him. I became a Christ follower.

At an international missions conference in 2004 at Christian Fellowship Church, I met Glen Osborn and learned about China Outreach Ministries (COM). I was impressed by the ministries sponsored by the church, including COM.

Two years later, with my husband James, I took my first mission trip to a village in Central America. It was an eye-opening and life-changing experience. It was the first time I wit-

nessed how missionaries built villages and schools and shared the gospel with people in the villages who lived in underprivileged conditions.

Upon our return, I received a clear calling to serve the Lord, even though I didn't know the direction and the specifics about my calling.

We joined mission trips to Burkina Faso, Haiti, and China while I also took tests to identify my spiritual gift, if any. There was no indication that missions was my gift. I knew all along, James has the gift of serving and identifying needs. I was the one seeking.

One afternoon, I chatted with Pastor Phil Holliday, and we prayed about my calling and desire. He pointed out that my gift is giving because he saw how willingly I gave, and with God's provision, I was able to give. I started to support missionaries around the world. I began giving to COM and became a table host for the annual banquets.

God blessed my business, providing steady government contracts in the aviation industry. I continued giving, and his provision never stopped.

In 2007, I noticed hundreds of Chinese graduate students coming to universities in the greater Washington, DC, area. James and I made friends and shared the gospel with them using plain Chinese. Cherrydale Baptist Church in Arlington, Virginia, offered classrooms for our Bible studies. We grew to five groups in the first year. I think it was our charisma and particularly James' good cooking that brought them!

God had given us a large home which we shared with the students for temporary housing and weekend gatherings. They called us "uncle" and "auntie," and we built trust and respect easily. They were comfortable sharing with us in ways they might not be with their peers.

The next year we led nearly 20 students to Christ even though we were not trained evangelists. The Holy Spirit was at work! And the number multiplied fast in the following years. Many parents of these students also accepted

Christ. Being a businesswoman, I had never pictured myself bringing people to Christ. What a blessing!

During this time, God also continued to teach me about giving. There was a book high on my bookshelf about biblical finances that I had never read. When a friend needed help with finances, I pulled the book down for her. The pages opened to the middle, where my finger pointed to a subtitle, "God Gives, God Takes Away." This was an awesome moment for me. I realized that we are stewards of all God has given us. "I" am not doing the giving. I am the instrument the Lord uses to give.

I began to give away 40% of my income—the first 10% to the church and the other 30% to missions. Over time, my COM support has broadened. Other than COM, I also currently support more than 20 missions organizations.

In 2007, Glen Osborn invited me to join the COM Board of Directors. I learned and served for 12 years with great pleasure. The idea of "giving Christ to China's future leaders" is exciting to me because these students in the US can go back to China as effective leaders with big impact.

I know it is my calling: to give—not just financially, also spiritually by facilitating Bible study groups. I give God all the glory that I am able to serve His Kingdom through giving. What a joy!



In the midst of this season of global crisis, God has been working in new ways in the lives of Chinese students and scholars. Here are just a few of their stories.

■ We met a student at the beginning of the pandemic who lost a dear relative and was unable to travel for the funeral. We reached out to her with Christ's love and the comfort of the Psalms. When she finally got a plane to travel, she called from the quarantine hotel the first day. She said she saw a difference in how Christians treated her as a Chinese person even while others were afraid or blaming, and she made a decision to become a Christ follower herself. She is growing now and meeting with us weekly.

## Charitable Gift Annuities

A Very Popular Tool for Donors

## Acharitable gift annuity (CGA) is a great way to give to the

outreach of COM, while at the same time creating a fixed income stream for life. If you are 65 years of age or older, you simply make a gift of \$10,000 or more in cash or securities in exchange for a non-revocable CGA agreement. Some of the many benefits include:

- Payments to you for your life and the life of your loved one (either monthly, quarterly, semi-annually, or annually)
- Great rates based on your age at the time your CGA is funded
- Immediate (partial) tax deduction and tax-free income (possibly) for years
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$  Deferred and possible avoided capital gains tax for gifts of appreciated assets

For annuity gifts to COM, at the time you pass on to heaven, the amount remaining in your CGA will then be given to COM. The contribution will be used by COM to continue its mission and to help ensure its ongoing support of missionaries.
