

'M ALWAYS AMAZED by jigsaw puzzles. Growing up in China, I never saw a puzzle until I came to America. The first time I saw one. I wondered how each of the seemingly disjunct pieces turns out to be indispensable in forming the final picture. I once asked a dumb question: how many pieces does it take to form a puzzle? Well, the answer is: all of them!

It is the same with COM's ministry, which includes many pieces—our staff serving the Chinese on campuses, their supporting family members, volunteers, our board members, leadership and support staff, churches, and individuals that pray and financially support our ministries. All these pieces, when put together by the master's hand, form a picture of the body of Christ working together to give Christ to China's future leaders.

E CAREFUL, Jonah brought a storm when he tried to go away from his calling." That was the advice of my COM ministry leader, David, as I was graduating with my PhD. I believed in my heart that the Lord was really calling me to serve him in full-time ministry. But I thought I needed a salary to survive, so I accepted a post-doc research job at Penn State.

David was right. There was a storm—a storm in my heart.

From the first day at Penn State, I struggled about God's calling. My heart was not satisfied. Then I passed through five years of weakness, struggling, and temptation.

My life had changed so much in recent years, and I wanted to help others find this change. I understood the doubts and obstacles for Chinese students and scholars when confronted with Christianity. I had been one of them.

Here is the beginning of my story that had brought me to this point.

Growing up in China, atheism was the default value in our education. Christianity was described as an enemy of science. I did not doubt atheism, and I loved science. Entering college, I started to feel life's pressure. A solution I could easily figure out was to continue my education. During my master's program, I met Ying, and we got married when we finished our degrees. A better job did not come, so, like many other students from China, my wife and I both came to America to pursue PhDs.

In America, it was the first time we heard about Christianity other than what we had learned from government textbooks. I didn't believe God was real, and I was shaken by the first Christian I met, a PhD student in chemistry. She told me that her God is real. This simple statement made me think that there might be something important that I didn't know. If God

really existed, it was a big deal for my life. I had to find the answer.

Hope began to grow in my heart. I wondered how wonderful life could be if God were real. After several months of spiritual struggle, by his mercy, God revealed himself to me. My world changed. I experienced an excitement that I'd never known in my 28 years of life.

I started to attend the China Outreach Ministries Bible study group at my university. In the following months, I knew God, Jesus, and salvation were all true, but I hesitated to follow. There was a day I realized my so-called freedom could only bring me trouble. Surrendering to the Lord was the only way to change to my life. So I decided to follow Jesus.

David Sun, the COM leader, soon asked Ying and me to help him start another campus group. From then, our lives were changed little by little. We



could not imagine anything else more interesting, more exciting, or more meaningful than such a ministry.

When I was going to graduate, David counseled me, "I saw your passion was not in your research, but in ministry. How about you join COM?" I was not ready to answer this question. In my mind, the only way for me to survive was to have a post-doc position. So, against David's advice, that's when I decided to go to Penn State.

Though the next five years were stormy, God's strong hand led me still. He helped me overcome my fear. He gave me enough faith to follow his call no matter what the cost. I left my career in scientific research for the ministry God had given me. Now, as full-time campus staff with COM, I finally know the joy of living out his call for










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Celebrating 60 Years of COM Ministry

HEN JAMES HOWELL PYKE I and his wife, Annabel, set sail from America on a slow boat to China on their wedding day in 1873, could they have possibly imagined the story that God was writing?

The Pykes' legacy continued as their son Fred and his wife, Frances, became missionaries in China. Fred and Frances were followed by their son, James, and his wife, Margaret, making three generations of missions in mainland China. The Pykes were forced to leave China after the Communist takeover, but the vision carried on in their hearts and lives. Their dream was to continue the ministry they had devoted their lives to—reaching the Chinese with the saving gospel of Christ.

In 1959, Fred and Frances Pyke and their son, James, founded the American branch of the Chinese Overseas Christian Mission (COCM). This new story that began 60 years ago continues today through China Outreach Ministries.

Under the leadership of Rev.
Donald McIntosh in 1969,
COCM/USA began raising
funds to facilitate Christian
radio broadcasts into China through
the programming of Far East Broadcasting Company and later through
Trans World Radio. Chinese missionaries were supported and sent out to
their own people in countries outside
of China.

With President Earnest Hummer taking the helm in 1982, a new direction soon began to take shape. With the influx of thousands of mainland Chinese graduate students and scholars to US and Canadian campuses in the 1980s, COCM recognized an unprecedented opportunity.

In 1988, the organization began placing staff at major university campuses with large numbers of Chinese students and research scholars.

The organization then was renamed China Outreach Ministries (COM) in 1993.

When Glen Osborn became the third President in 2001, COM had 32 staff on 20 campuses. Under his leadership over the next 15 years, those numbers grew to 75 staff on 52 campuses. COM dedicated a new headquarters office in Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania, in 2008, and the leadership and support staff expanded to include a Director of Development, Campus Ministry Director, Mobilization Directors, Certified Public Accountant, and additional administrative office personnel. By God's grace, the financial strength of the organization also increased through key capital campaigns and significant special gifts.

In the past two years since his installment, COM has further built up its
leadership personnel and organiza-

tional capacity, and the ministry continues to grow.

God continues to bless COM's ministry. Currently, we are setting a priority on training to enhance our ministry. We have developed multi-faceted ministries including friendship evangelism, hospitality, Bible studies, ESL classes, discipleship training, translating and publishing resource materials, and holding retreats and conferences. Though there have been tremendous changes in culture, technology, and globalization over the last 60 years, COM remains steadfastly committed to the core of the original ministry — sharing God's love with the Chinese. We believe God has a wonderful plan for the Chinese people. The best is still yet to come!

"My great-grandfather James Howell Pyke began a legacy of mission work among the Chinese in 1873. Now, 146 years later, COM is carrying on that legacy with its thoughtful and loving ministry to Chinese students and scholars in the United States. Having served on the board of COM for many years, I have seen the impressive changes and strategic initiatives that COM has fostered in this great challenge of helping to reach 1.4 billion Chinese with the good news and hope of Jesus Christ.

Now under the capable leadership of Daniel Su, we continue to pray for COM as it moves forward in meeting its great challenge."

Donating Appreciated Stocks Can Be Better Than Cash

In light of the stock market so far this year, we wanted to let you know of one way you can give that can be a blessing both to you and to COM. If you own long-term stocks (longer than one year) that have appreciated since you purchased them, in most cases you'd likely save taxes by donating the stocks directly to COM instead of selling the stocks, paying the taxes, and sending the remainder to COM as a cash donation. This is also good Christian stewardship. An additional benefit is that you will receive a tax-deductible receipt for the full value of your donated amount (value on the day you transferred the stocks).
