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Ministry Pivots



Phoebe Hoyle, Northeast Area

Passionate for missions, Phoebe has been working with COM for more than 25 years. During this time she has experienced many changes in student ministry.

In the last few years, the number of Chinese students on Phoebe's local campus has decreased. Also, she finds that today's students are more independent and less likely to come to ministry events. Resilient, however, Phoebe presses forward in new ways. She goes to where the students are. And rather than prioritizing numbers, she and her team of volunteers focus individually on the students who respond.

Each week, Phoebe and her COM ministry team now host a small, informal lunch at the student center on campus. Phoebe uses social media to reach out individually to Chinese students and invite them. Having about three to five students attending

allows for one-to-one connections.

Phoebe finds that if she and other team members are too quick to talk about spiritual topics, the students may not come back. So instead, they build relationships and find opportunities to introduce the gospel in ways that apply directly to an individual student's situation.

For example, one student recently shared that she worked and studied 12 hours a day, seven days a week, until her brain could no longer function. Phoebe took this opportunity to explain how God created a Sabbath day for our rest, and she gave the young lady an inspirational autobiography of a Christian who shares of his life-changing encounter with Jesus.

Phoebe is encouraged and motivated as she sees the impact of intentional relationships. God keeps her going, she says, as he directs her path. As the landscape of Chinese student ministry is continually changing, COM staffers are discovering new ways to reach out and to build relationships. Though ministry approaches may evolve with the changing needs and interests of students, the vision remains: Giving Christ to China's Future Leaders.

Rebecca Daulton, Xin Luan and Ying Deng, Mid-Atlantic Area

At one campus with historically large numbers of Chinese visiting scholars, the COM ministry team has seen a significant change—a growing number of undergraduates and young graduate students.

These students are often lonely. Rebecca and her teammates, married couple Xin and Ying, wanted to create a space for them to find community. Now, Xin and Ying open their home weekly for a multi-course Chinese meal and discussion time designed for this younger generation.

Rebecca says the students find the home space comfortable and the setting allows them to ask honest questions. They're now putting down their phones and talking to each other and to the leaders. They're trying to figure out life and steps for their future.

One student shared that he never had real friends before. Recently, he accepted Christ with one of the volunteers!

Jessica, Mountain West Area

Though the number of Chinese students has recently been decreasing at her campus, Jessica is thankful for the opportunity to go deeper with those who are here. One key to this success has been partnering with volunteers.

Jessica says she is so grateful for a growing number of volunteers in the local ministry. This fosters personal relationships and opportunities to care for the students individually. In response, it is exciting to see some students are moving from just having conversation partners to now attending Bible study after one or two semesters of friendship with the volunteers. "They are more open to faith," Jessica says, " and God is answering our prayers for students in very direct ways."

As Jessica and the volunteers are sharing the gospel, they are seeing people come to Christ. Jessica says, "I know it is God opening the doors, and I see his hand at work in the students' lives as he draws them closer."

When my husband, David, and I arrived in the United States one year ago, the first few weeks were tough for me. David was busy with his work as a post-doctoral scholar, but I had left behind my career in China. I had no friends here, and I was inexperienced with conversational English.

David wanted me to make friends. so he took me to a Chinese church. I also met an American couple, Marie and Lou, and their co-worker, Luke, with China Outreach Ministries.

My Faith Journey to Jesus

At first, I felt uncomfortable with church. I didn't want to feel controlled. I was cautious, and I asked challenging guestions. I found that people were open to my questions, though. I could freely discuss my thoughts and be myself.

As I started to feel relaxed and safe, I began to make friends. I felt loved, and soon I realized I was not lonely anymore. Worship time was special for me also, and I felt peaceful affection in my heart.

During this time. I wanted to believe God, but I still struggled to believe. I felt strong emotions as I met with these caring people, however. I wanted to belong and to live in hope as they did.

I also started to join Marie, Lou, and Luke for weekly meetings. I saw again that Christians were full of love. Most impressive were their beautiful smiles. I wanted to be with these kind of people, and I wanted to be a person who could smile beautifully, too.

Then one day at Marie's house, my heart finally opened. I believed! I could pray from my heart, and God became real to me at that moment. It was like opening the door to a new world.

I wanted to know more about God, so I started reading the Bible myself. To understand the big picture, I started with Genesis, listening to audio recordings. In about three months. I listened to the whole Bible. As I trusted Jesus, my views-and the pursuit of my life-started to change.

At nine weeks in my pregnancy, however, there was no heartbeat. I knew that children are God's gift. How could this be? After miscarrying, I grieved my loss by staying home alone. I cried and didn't read the Bible.

David encouraged me to go back to church, and eventually I agreed. There were the same smiling people there, but my smile felt fake.

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Purposeful Retirement

When Bob and Joanne Kraftson entered the "empty nest" stage almost 30 years ago, they were open to ideas for how they would invest their time during this new place in life. As God was directing their path, they didn't realize then all he had in store for them.

During their time of discovery, the Kraftsons visited a couple of churches that talked about international student ministry. "That struck a chord with us." Bob said. And soon the new story began.

Bob and Joanne reached out to a campus ministry at the University of Minnesota, and they were referred to Glenn Kenadijan, a local staff member with China Outreach Ministries. At Glenn's invitation, they attended a Chinese friendship dinner. During the event, they exchanged contact information with two Chinese students. sparking what would become lifelong friendships.

The Kraftsons invited their new Chinese friend, Wei, to a Bible study they were starting. At Christmas, they had a gift exchange game, and Wei went home with a Christian book for skeptics. Before long he was answering questions that others in the study were asking. It was exciting and encouraging to watch Wei grow in faith. Bob and Joanne connected more and more to the local COM

ministry for the next several years, working alongside Glenn and COM staffers Tom and Kathy Lindstrom. They realized this was an ideal way for them to serve together as a couple.

The Kraftsons loved getting to know the students and learning about their culture. "We were aware of our call to share the gospel," they said, "and this gave us a relationship-oriented opportunity to do that." Along the way, they were blessed to see fruit from the ministry, such as their friend Wei becoming a Christian and growing to become active in ministry outreach himself

As Bob and Joanne approached retirement, they began to think about next steps. Glenn encouraged them to transition into part-time ministry, and they agreed. They joined COM as "tentmakers," unpaid staff members. They found that participating in staff retreats and conferences was an opportunity to be part of a larger ministry, and they developed meaningful relationships within the extended COM community.

In their expanded role, the Kraftsons served as local volunteer coordinators. organizing a network of more than 100 volunteers from about 20 churches. With each influx of students, volunteers provided airport pickups and homestays for large numbers of new arrivals. These bridge-building activities led to many students attending weekly friendship dinners and Bible study meetings.

When Glenn transitioned to a new

ministry assignment with COM in another state, the Kraftsons continued their volunteer engagement as team members with Tom and Kathy. Over the years, the COM Minneapolis team adapted to new ways of doing ministry as the needs of students changed.

A core part of the Kraftsons' ministry now is a regular Bible study by Zoom. In this contemporary context, they are able to continue relationships with students who have moved awavincluding many who are back in China.

Along with their ongoing COM ministry involvement, the Kraftsons still have time for a variety of other interests, too—such as spending time with their adult children, traveling, and biking. Encouraging others who are approaching retirement, they recommend finding meaningful engagement such as they have found with COM. "Life expectancy is going up, and many people will have a long retirement," they explain. "You'll need something more to do than play golf."

Twenty-five years ago, serving in campus ministry with American students, Joe and his wife Liz reached a pivotal point. Their organization was encouraging overseas work, so when they learned about a faith-based company with schools and business offices in rapidly changing East Asia, they decided to make the move.

Living internationally was a reframing experience for the May family. As they began to consider a return to America nine years later, East Asia was, by then, forever in their hearts.

Soon a providential Google search led them to China Outreach Ministries.

After contacting the COM office, Joe met with the organization's leaders and his prospective teammate, Dorothy Boothe, in Georgia. When they all "really hit it off," the pathway was clear. This led Joe and Liz to what has now been 15 years in Chinese student ministry.

MOBILE PAYMENTS, HIGH-SPEED TRAINS, AND EXPRESS FOOD DELIVERY.

During a visit to China last summer, I was struck by a scene markedly different from my previous trips, even four years ago.

As I observed how modern technology and conveniences have reshaped everyday life in such a short time, I began to think about Chinese students in the United States who are coming from this new context. How will this supercharged environment affect their worldview and their expectations in America?

Newly arriving students from China have been immersed in a high-tech, high-speed way of life. Understanding this and responding thoughtfully helps us in building relationships with them. Here are just a few glimpses of the new China.

Glimpse 1: Installing popular apps on your cellphone and linking them to your bank account can fulfill almost all your purchasing needs. Users are willing to accept the trade-off of sacrificing personal privacy for the benefits of these services.

Glimpse 2: The efficiency of high-speed trains is truly impressive. The cities I visited span the northeast, north, and east provinces of China, and the modern train network seamlessly connects them. Today's younger students are accustomed to travel and enthusiastic for new experiences.

Glimpse 3: Food express delivery workers can be spotted all over the streets, swiftly navigating the city at all hours, often on electric bikes. Students enjoy the convenience of these deliveries, and they continue to utilize these services when they arrive in America.

All the glitz, however, is a façade for what's happening in people's lives.

After almost four years of wrestling with COVID-19, most people recognize the pandemic's deep impact on society and personal lives. Further, China's economic outlook is far from optimistic. Many people are actively pursuing career changes and willingly extending their work hours for financial gain.

It's against this hectic backdrop that I came to realize the profound extent of the spiritual needs in China. As the entire society is engulfed in a pervasive atmosphere of materialism and the worship of wealth, it is difficult for people to engage in deep contemplation of faith.

Despite the many challenges, however, I also witnessed God's unwavering faithfulness throughout our journey. The Almighty Lord reigns, and he is eager to deliver the gospel through us, despite our unworthiness.

Applications for Reaching Out to Chinese Students in America

Regardless of technology, relevant ministry approaches are grounded in relationships. Go where students are and make friends with the attitude of learning from them.

If students have travel plans for the holidays, connect with them on ordinary days instead. A well-designed day trip, outdoor recreation, or going to the gym together are all good opportunities.

Effective gospel discussions will require a solid foundation of personal relationships. Invest meaningful time in a few key individuals. They may become your faithful coworkers!


Returning to a Loving God
