The Importance of Partnership

he kidnapping of Ying-Ying Zhang, age 26, sent a chill through Chinese student communities here in America. Zhang was new to America as a visiting scholar at the University of Illinois at Urbana/Champaign. Before her disappearance, she was looking for a ride to take her to sign a rental lease when the suspect's car approached her. Zhang came to the university for a one-year research appointment in the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Science. She is presumed dead and the FBI has a suspect in custody.

Her tragic story helps underscore the importance of the work of our COM missionaries; from meeting students as soon as they arrive in the United States to helping them find a good Christian community. Thousands of new students and scholars arrived in the U.S. this summer. Please pray for our COM missionaries as they help them with practical needs, encourage them to build ongoing relationships and invite them to Christian activities.

I can still recall that hot summer day when I drove to the Philadelphia airport to pick up arriving students. I called Beth to prepare more food for dinner in order to feed a family of four. After dinner, I took them to temporary housing. The next day, I found myself helping them register at school, open a checking account at a bank, buy a bike at Kmart and get to the local Chinese grocery store. From my firsthand experience, I know our COM missionaries find themselves on the giving end most of the time. Your prayers and support can make a world of difference in the lives of our COM missionaries. Thanks to your partnership and the Lord's provision, we are continuing to give Christ to China's future leaders.



N ADDITION TO staff members joining us at the COM Staff Conference, God has blessed us with two new staff members!



Last Thanksgiving night, we were invited over to a sister's house. While we were just sharing about what we were grateful for. Jean replied with tears in her eyes that she was grateful for the welcoming acceptance and love she received from people around her. That night, she decided to give her heart to Jesus and invited him to be her savior. At that moment, I could not help but burst into tears and shout, "Hallelujah!" Jean was baptized on Easter Sunday this year.

I think we just take them for granted as part of our culture. Artifacts was one system that fascinated me and included 3D objects, clothing, jewelry and furniture—even the way we arrange furniture is a way of communicating! I was intrigued. Olfactory also made sense because certain smells remind me of warmth and love, such as the smell of tri-tip over
